T. Peter Kingham, MD is completing a surgical oncology fellowship at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. He has participated in missions to Malawi, Mexico, Sierra Leone, South Africa

and Tanzania, and was a Yale/Johnson & Johnson international health scholar for surgery. As part of his residency training at New York University Hospital, he did two years of cancer research at the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and started a certificate degree program in international surgery.

Dr. Kingham has an M.D. from SUNY Stony Brook School of Medicine and a B.A. from Yale University.



Adam L. Kushner, MD, MPH, FACS is a board certified general surgeon who practices exclusively in developing countries. He is a Lecturer in Surgery at Columbia University and has

worked as a general surgeon and educator in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Haiti, India, Liberia, Malawi, Sierra Leone and Sudan, led landmine assessment missions to Azerbaijan and Kosovo, conducted human rights assessments in Iraq, taught trauma care and landmine injury management in Colombia, Ecuador and Nicaragua, and worked as a health specialist following the 2005 tsunami in Indonesia. Since 2003 he has participated in US military training exercises as a subject matter expert for human rights and humanitarian assistance issues and is a member of the planning committee of the World Health Organization's Global Initiative for Emergency and Essential Surgical Care.

Dr. Kushner completed his general surgery residency at the University of Texas Health Science Center - San Antonio, has an M.D. from the Mount Sinai School of Medicine, an M.P.H. from Johns Hopkins, and a B.A. from Cornell University.




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What we do

SOS is an organization devoted to improving surgical care in resource poor environments with a tripartite mission of developing novel staffing and training programs, functioning as an information and networking resource for surgeons, and supporting surgical research.

The SOS program model (as illustrated below) entails identifying local surgeons in host nations and in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and the World Health Organization undertaking a needs assessment of surgical capacity. Subsequently interventions are planned based on manpower and material needs.





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STAFFING AND TRAINING ASSISTANCE

SUPPORT FOR LOCAL SURGEONS

One of the biggest problems affecting health facilities in resource poor environments is the lack of highly trained health personnel capable of performing safe surgery. SOS endeavors to help with this situation both financially and academically.

Financial support

Local health care workers who agree to abide by ethical and international standards of providing safe surgery to local populations receive financial assistance from SOS. To properly implement this program, a few basic conditions are necessary: a local contact person must be identified who will take responsibility for disbursing the necessary funds; local salary needs and candidates must be identified; and the proper arrangements made so that monies can be disbursed fairly and equitably.

In 2009 we continued to support surgical health care workers at Connaught Hospital in Sierra Leone. US\$ 800 was disbursed monthly to supplement salaries of approximately 100 operation room staff and surgical ward nurses.

Additionally, a 40' container of medical and surgical supplies and equipment was provided to Connaught Hospital. These materials have enabled an increase in emergency surgical cases and care for patients without financial resources.

International standards and best practices support

In an effort to promote safe and standardized surgical curricula, SOS members work along with international and academic organizations. SOS members are involved with the World Health Organization, Global Initiative for Emergency and Essential Surgical Care (GIEESC), and this cooperation will continue as plans for future dissemination of the Integrated Management of Emergency and Essential Surgical Care (IMEESC) tool kit continues.

Training opportunities:

SOS surgeons assisted with teaching junior doctors and medical students at Connaught Hospital in Sierra Leone. In 2009 daily morning meetings began in the Department of Surgery and weekly attending rounds were reinstituted.

SOS also provided funds for Dr. Russel White, MD, MPH, FACS, a world expert in the insertion of self expanding metal stents for inoperable esophageal cancer, to undertake a training program in hopsitals in Malawi. A total of 18 surgeons and 44 nurses were trained in stent insertion and palliative care.

A mass casaulty incident training course and simulation was conducted in Freetown, Sierra Leone in July 2009. Over 80 emergency manangement and health professionals met for the first time and participated in a 2 day workshop which included a live disaster simulation.



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Ad hoc programs

Members are encouraged to work with SOS headquarters to identify needs and propose novel projects to help care for patient requiring surgical services in developing countries. The first such ad hoc program assisted patients with esophageal cancer in Malawi.

SUPPORT FOR SURGICAL MISSIONS

SOS undertakes limited direct surgical missions; however, in 2009 six surgeons participated in training and assistance missions at Connaught Hospital in Sierra Leone. The emphasis of the missions was on teaching skills and enhancing local capabilities rather than providing direct patient care.

Information and Networking

As a focal point for surgeons desiring to work in developing countries, SOS maintains a website, a member and facility database, and publishes a newsletter. SOS acts as a resource to provide background information and standards on how to work and function in resource poor environments. Information is available through the SOS website and through communication with SOS members.

The SOS website is divided into four sections: About Us, Opportunities, Events, and Resources. On-line donations are solicited through groundspring.org.

Surgical facility database

As a resource for linking surgeons and health facilities, through partnerships with academic programs, NGOs, international organizations, and local ministries of health, the SOS database is a source of information on personnel and opportunities.

Interested persons are requested to submit an application. Health facility information is entered when needs and contact information is provided.

Newsletter

A newsletter is published and distributed by email to members and interested parties. The newsletter serves as a marketing and informational resource. Updates are published, new members and facilities are listed, and facilities are featured. Member mission reports and case studies are also published. Members are encouraged to submit articles which are then edited for length and appropriateness. In June 2009, Mr. Jeffrey Leow assumed the responsibilities of newsletter editor.



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SUPPORT FOR RESEARCH

SOS looks to support research into the global burden of surgical disease. It is believed that before additional resources will be allocated for surgical diseases there needs to be a better definition of the underlying problem.
